Howdy St. John's Family,

Are you ready for Revelation 2, Electric Boogaloo? Here we go! We left off having read up to Revelation 16 but did not really get the opportunity to unpack everything. We remember that John was using historical references and symbols as a sort of code to be able to speak to the churches without being identified by anyone outside of the seven church communities. This allowed him to critique the current political climate and speak to justice. In chapters 12 to 14 we sort of glossed over the *symbols* or the *signs*. In chapter 12, for example, we have a story about a dragon and a woman fighting in a cosmic battle. The woman is the church community, and the dragon is the oppression they are experiencing. John is saying that nothing on earth, not even the Roman Empire, can separate them from the love of Jesus.

In chapter 13 John references some of the apocalyptic visions of Daniel to speak to the economic propaganda machine that is being used by the Roman Empire to control the masses. This is the part where we get that mark of the beast, 666, that would be on everyone's forehead or hand. John is making an Old Testament reference to the shema, the prayer of allegiance to God found in the book of Deuteronomy. This 'anti-shema' is John saying that people will place their government allegiances above their devotion to the true God. This is where the cool code stuff comes in, because if we look at the Greek and Hebrew, we see that the letters had numeric values. So, if you add up the letters that spell NERO, CAESAR, and BEAST, you end up with 666. John is not saying that Nero is the only example, but one of many examples where people place a nation above God, like Babylon, Rome, and onward.

In chapter 14 we see two expressions of Christ's return. The first is the slain lamb of God returning with a diverse army representative of the many nations of Christians. They conquer Babylon, which represents any nation placed above God. Then, in the second half of the chapter, we see Jesus return to harvest the believers, like a farmer harvesting grain. The whole idea behind these images is setting up the choice between following Christ and following the world.

We finish off in chapters 15 and 16 with the number seven popping up again. There are seven divine bowls that are poured out like the plagues in the exodus story. When we get to the sixth bowl, we find that our dragon friend has returned. Here John talks about a battle in a field called 'Armageddon.' Armageddon was an actual place; it was a plain in Northern Israel where a number of battles were fought in the history of the Hebrew people. We see this in

Ezekiel, and if we look at the writings of Ezekiel, we see that it is a message of God conquering the rebellious nations.

Okay, deep breath, we are almost there! In chapters 17 to 21 we see John return to the theme once more of the fall of Babylon, the final battle, and the creation of the new Jerusalem. This was not meant to be a prophecy about an *actual battle*, but a commentary on the way that this cycle repeats over and over again in history. When unjust nations rule with oppression and rebel against justice (like Babylon, and Rome, etc.) they will eventually fall. **Christ's people will always continue to fight to create a just world for all.** Christ's people will always work to make it more on earth as it is in heaven. And when they succeed in the name of Christ, the new Jerusalem will reign. This will look like a marriage between heaven and earth! Everyone will live in peace and harmony with God. The presence of God and the lamb will permeate every square inch of this new world.

That is the whole kit and kaboodle. Revelation is a symbolic vision of hope! It's not a playbook for the end of the world, but a reminder that when history repeats itself and we have another evil empire on our hands, good *will* win. Jesus is greater than the highs and lows, and the lamb of God will always triumph. So, I guess the moral of this strange vision is to rest in the hope found in Jesus Christ, Amen and Amen!

Consistory Summary

The Consistory meeting was held on September 9 at 7pm in the Trinity room. After joys and concerns, Nancy Kramer-Moyer led devotions. The minutes from the June 10 meeting were approved. Under the Ministers report, Pastor Becky shared that the youth collaboration for a multi-church pizza night was a success. Four churches joined together for pizza and a movie. This year the Sunday School Chapel will have a breakfast table with breakfast items available for our youth. Pastor Becky shared the internship covenant that was approved last year so that the current consistory could review it. This summer we had three children baptized from our wider community. These families had been turned away by other churches. St. John's UCC will continue to be open and welcoming to everyone who wishes to have their child baptized in the name of Jesus Christ.

Under Fellowship Committee, Lynn Cloak reported that the annual picnic was a success. A cake was shared on June 8 for the confirmation celebration. Special cupcakes were shared on June 29 in celebration of another completed task in the Step-by-Step Building Renovation work. Strawberry cupcakes were made for July 27 when we celebrated another step completed in the Step-by-Step Building Renovations. Anonymous donations were collected by Lynn to celebrate Pastor Becky becoming a foster mother; the money was earmarked for a membership to the Lehigh Valley Zoo. Additional funds were given for school supplies. On August 10 the VBS Carnival service was a success with hot dogs, ice pops, and other treats. In June the hoagie sale orders were taken, and orders were delivered on August 10. There is a pulled pork BBQ sale planned for October 5.

Under Property, Barney Cook shared his offer to research different options to fix the cement steps out front. He will report back to the Consistory. Under Christian Education, Pastor Becky shared that she will be working with other pastors to create a youth coalition for large group activities. The Christmas Pageant will be about Christmas around the world and will take place on December 21. Jim Bronfenbrenner presented the Treasurer's report. Under Personnel it was reported that Omayra's contract was not renewed through Job Connections Inc. Personnel will now be working with Allied. Under the Green Team, Nancy Kramer-Moyer reported that the Green Team book study was a success. There will be a cleanup in the community on October 26. Under Benevolence it was reported that the invitations have been sent to nonprofits to apply for the grant. Nancy Rissell reported that for the Scholarship Committee, they met with a lawyer and are fine-tuning a draft of the scholarship application. This scholarship would be for members of our congregation. The next meeting will be on October 14 at 7pm. October Special Mission Offering

Our Special Mission Offering for October is **Neighbors in Need. Neighbors in Need (NIN)** supports the UCC's ministries of justice and compassion throughout the United States. Two-thirds of the offering is used by the UCC's Justice and Witness Ministries to fund a wide array of justice initiatives, advocacy efforts and direct services. In 2025, 26 grants were awarded to churches to run such programs.

The remaining third is used to support our Native American neighbors within the UCC. This is accomplished by NIN's support of the UCC's Council for American Indian Ministry (CAIM). Currently, there are 21 UCC congregations on reservations and one urban multi-tribal congregation in Minneapolis, Minnesota. The funds are used to support the ministries of these congregations. CAIM also serves as a resource for more than 1,000 individuals from other tribes and nations who are members of other UCC congregations throughout the U.S.

We would ask that you prayerfully consider giving generously to support these ministries of justice and compassion throughout the month of October. You may do so by writing a check to St. John's UCC-Allentown designated for NIN, making it a designated part of your weekly offering or by using the DONATE button on our website. Thank you.

Green Team Book Study

For three sessions in August, Rick Guhl and Bill Falla hosted a discussion on *Cathedral on Fire: a church handbook for the climate crisis*, written by Brooks Berndt, Minister of Environmental Justice for the United Church of Christ. This short 54-page study guide was thoughtfully written. It focused clearly on the emergency faced by the world and the potential of an activated Church to make a profound difference in the outcome of that emergency.

Berndt used the metaphor of a grand cathedral inspiring awe and wonder for the natural world. This world is overheating due to carbon levels accumulating in the atmosphere, thus trapping heat as a blanket encircling the earth. Berndt posits that the Church, coming from a place of faith and calling for a fresh perspective, can make the difference for this world that is hot and getting hotter. After each of the seven chapters, Berndt presents several discussion questions to appreciate the deeper and larger issues. Action Plans, things people can actually do to inspire change and open a fresh perspective, are offered at the end of each chapter.

For example, in Chapter 3, Liberating Scripture to Liberate the Planet, I found his reinterpretation of the context and translation of the word *dominion* to be particularly meaningful. Traditionally, the word has meant that humankind (man) was to be the primary beneficiary of all the natural world resources, thus effectively reinforcing the hierarchy of domination. But a more accurate translation of the word in context means having a caretaking function; more like a gardener caring for all the unique beings and resources in the garden of God's creation.

Following Berndt's conversation on transformation, a new theology emerging from a time of intense struggle and painful uncertainty, he asks, "Toward what possibilities is God calling us in this crisis situation?" (pg44)

One answer to this call Berndt says is focus on the youth. Youth are leading the generational justice movement as prophets. Youth are calling for and demanding action. Possibilities are emerging. The Church is being reborn as a modern Pentecost movement, spreading the mission of a new vision for the world.


