#### **Consistory Summary**

The Consistory meeting was held on October 14 at 7pm in the Trinity Room. Members of the Property Committee were also invited to attend this meeting, and a link was shared with the entire congregation. After sharing joys and concerns, Pastor Becky led devotionals.

The minutes from the September meeting were approved. Under the Minister's report, Pastor Becky shared that we will be replacing the quarterly purchase of bulletin covers with St. John's UCC-specific bulletin covers. This will save money, and the bulletin covers will be of a higher quality. Breakfast items have been made available for the children in the children's chapel area; the breakfast items have been well received. Covenant Card invitations were sent out last month along with a letter of explanation. The Covenant Cards will be dedicated on November 23. The Advent Breakfast is on November 30. An advent devotional has been chosen and ordered; it will be made available at the back of the sanctuary in November. Pastor Becky asked if the church would be willing to try having a 'Pray Ground', a designated space in our sanctuary for children. Consistory agreed to try this for a month-long period of time and then assess the benefits.

Under New Business, it was shared that the most recent project in the Step-By-Step Building Renovation Project was completed; thank you to Barney Cook for fixing the stairs and thank you again to Barney and Al Cloak for replacing the sidewalk grates on our 6<sup>th</sup> Street sidewalk. Discussion took place and it was determined that the next project will be fixing the lights in the sanctuary. For more information about this project, see the below section on the building renovations.

Under Fellowship and Fundraising Lynn Cloak reported that the pulled pork barbecue sale brought a profit of \$266. 50. We will continue the hoagie sale every month, and the annual nuts and truffle sale is being planned for November 16 and 23. Under Property there was no further discussion. Under Christian Education Pastor Becky restated that the pageant will be on December 21. The Crop Walk took place on October 19. Jim Bronfenbrenner presented the treasurers' report, and it was accepted. Under Personnel, Pastor Becky shared that we are now working with Allied Agency; we are currently receiving resumes for a new administrative assistant.

Under the Green Team, Nancy Kramer-Moyer highlighted the upcoming Community Cleanup on October 26. Under Benevolence, it was shared that all the Grant application applications have been received and the first meeting of the Benevolence Committee will be on October 21. Under the Scholarship Team, it was reported that the group met with an attorney. The group will continue to work with the attorney as they create the scholarship. The next meeting will be on November 11 at 7pm. Pastor Becky led the closing prayer and the meeting adjourned.

#### **Green Team Report**

This month the Green Team shares this devotion by Mary Luti.

Then I saw a new heaven and a new earth, and I saw the holy city coming down out of heaven. It shone with the glory of God, and its brilliance was like that of a very precious jewel, like a jasper, clear as crystal. - Revelation 21:1-2, 11 abridged (NIV)

During the restoration of Notre Dame after the 2019 fire, a reporter toured the roof where carpenters were securing the rebuilt rafters.

They told him that the wood they were using was from oak trees selected to match exactly the contours of the damaged ancient beams. Each had been carved meticulously to duplicate the peculiarities of the hand-tooled originals, including the medieval maker's mark on the undersides.

Those details were high and hidden, not for show. The public will never see them. "Faithful' only begins to describe this effort," the reporter wrote.

The pressure to finish on time was immense, but the worksite was surprisingly calm, imbued with quiet joy and certitude. When he asked one worker what the job meant to her, no words came. She wept.

The team leader acknowledged that the work was beset with unimaginable difficulties every day. Then he added, "But it's different when you work on something that has a soul. Beauty makes everything easier."

It's daunting to try to rebuild something that's been horrifically damaged. It takes everything you have. Details matter, the hidden ones more than anyone will ever know. It takes such a long time, too. The pressure is overwhelming. So much is at stake.

But because you're working on something soulful – human kinship, structures of justice and care, a polity of tender mercy, a new earth; and because what you're laboring on, what you're laboring for, what you're being given is so beautiful, you return to the jobsite of the world each day in calm, in joy, in receptive trust, and grateful flowing tears.

#### **Step-By-Step Essentials Building Renovations**

This month we celebrate another step completed! The following information is from Barney Cook, who conducted research and donated his time and labor to this building renovation project. Thank you Barney!

"Taking advantage of good weather and the positive feedback from my earlier message on this topic, I

went ahead and did some experimental work on the church steps with mixed but overall, positive results.

My first step was to try and remove the rust stains from the steps. This resulted in considerable reduction in the stains, but the stains were still quite visible, even from a distance. But the good news, as a result of cleaning the steps, I was able to deep clean the cracks of debris. The water pressure in Allentown is surprisingly strong. I completed this on Friday afternoon and was also able to dry the cracks before leaving with my shop vac.

With the cracks clean and with all loose fragments removed, I decided to fill the cracks with a cement patch mixture with epoxy additives on Saturday morning. This mixture contracts significantly and required two coats to hide the majority of the crack locations. While I had patch mixture in hand, I plastered over the major rust stain areas reducing greatly the visibility of them.

My suggested next step is to give the cement patch a couple of weeks to cure. Cool dry weather like we are having helps a lot. At that time I will apply a sealer, possibly with grit to prevent slippage, to the entire step area. This would complete the work that I intend to perform.

The result is not a new set of steps, but a functional one that should not cause anyone from thinking they are not safe to use.

My theory, and mine only, is the rebar is too close to the surface of the concrete. This prevents the concrete from insulating the rebar from expansion and contraction from heat and cold temperatures. As the rebar expands and contracts, it will continue to stress and crack the concrete. My work does not address any of this if that is part of the root cause.

Feel free to share with others. Any thoughts and comments are always welcomed.

Additionally, Barney Cook and Al Cloak replaced the grates on the sidewalk that cover the drain leading from our parking lot onto 6<sup>th</sup> Street. These metal grates had become warped over time. Barney and Al took measurements and replaced the sheets of metal with thicker sheets of corrugated steel. Each sheet was 100 pounds. They then painted the sheets. Thank you, Barney and Al!

At the consistory meeting on October 14, the Deacons, Elders, and Property Committee discussed the projects completed and discerned what the next project will be. We will be fixing the lighting in the sanctuary. This is essentially two projects, as we will need to replace the lights behind the large stained-glass window facing 6<sup>th</sup> Street with newer, more efficient LED lights. We will also need to re-wire two of the large lamps in the sanctuary (these are the large golden lamps over the pews). The project is estimated to be \$8,700.
