Howdy St. John's family,

Over the last two years I've been using this monthly letter as an opportunity to dive a little deeper into the letters of the New Testament. I have had so much fun reading and summarizing the scriptures, and hopefully you have enjoyed reading as I *nerd out* about the Bible. As I was contemplating the twelve months in this year, I was reminded that there were twelve tribes in the Hebrew Bible... that's why this year I'm going to be using each month as an opportunity to talk about the twelve tribes of Israel, the sons of Jacob that they were named for, and what some of their most important traits are.

Today we kick things off with Reuben, who was the first born of the twelve sons of Jacob. Most often when you have an oldest son, you can pretty much assume that they are going to be the ones who receive the largest inheritance and take over to rule the family at the death of the patriarch. This is not the case with Reuben. If we read the places in Genesis where Reuben is mentioned directly, we see that he was *a thoughtful guy*, as he has been seen picking flowers for his mother, and convincing his brothers *not* to murder Joseph. There was that whole selling him in the slavery thing, but we will stick a pin in that for now. The real reason that Reuben did not receive his expected inheritance is because he laid with his father's concubine, Bilhah. This was against the book of Leviticus and a taboo thing to do.

So, what do we need to know about the tribe of Reuben? One of the most important things to know is that the tribe of Reuben was part of what would become known as the lost tribes of Israel. We see that after the rule of King Solomon, David's son, the tribes are split into northern Israel and the kingdom from southern Judah, where Jerusalem was. This is something we will learn more about as we journey through the twelve tribes. Fun Fact: on the breast plate of the high priest, which we see described and crafted in Exodus 28, Reuben is represented by the ruby, or carnelian jewel. - Rev. Becky Sausser

## Consistory Summary
